1. OBJECTIVE

Based on MBRF's commitments to Integrity, Quality, and Safety, this Corporate Policy ("Policy") establishes the guidelines of MBRF S.A. ("MBRF" or the "Company") and its subsidiaries regarding the commitments and principles to be applied in its business activities, with a focus on integrating environmental and social aspects, as well as sustainable practices, into the management of MBRF's supply chain.

2. CONFIDENTIALITY STATUS

This is a public Policy.

3. APPLICABILITY

This Policy applies to all MBRF Business Partners, as well as any other stakeholders with whom MBRF trades grains - soybeans, corn, and sorghum - across all Brazilian biomes, in alignment with the Company's publicly disclosed commitments regarding origin monitoring and control.

4. ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

4.1 LEGAL, TAX, CORPORATE AFFAIRS AND PEOPLE EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENCY

The Legal, Tax, Corporate Affairs and People Executive Vice Presidency is responsible for proposing and updating this Policy with respect to the audience to which it applies, ensuring alignment with market best practices, as well as managing compliance by direct and indirect grain Business Partners with the guidelines established herein.

4.2 SUSTAINABILITY DIRECTORATE

The Sustainability Directorate is responsible for clarifying any questions related to this Policy, establishing the procedures required for its implementation, and communicating and training the target audience on the guidelines set forth in this Policy.

4.3 EMPLOYEES AND BUSINESS PARTNERS

All MBRF employees and grain Business Partners are responsible for complying with the guidelines established in this document.

5. GUIDELINES

MBRF is committed to enabling a sustainable grain supply chain whose sourcing originates from areas free from deforestation and native vegetation conversion. This commitment is supported through the monitoring and traceability of grains purchased from direct and indirect suppliers across Brazilian biomes, in accordance with the Company's public commitments.

This commitment also reinforces procurement procedures by ensuring compliance with key social and environmental criteria. To this end, grain Business Partners shall:

- Comply with all applicable environmental laws and regulations, as well as the provisions set forth in the MBRF Business Partner Code of Conduct and the MBRF Sustainability Policy.
- Respect human rights, dignity, aspirations, culture, and natural resource-based livelihoods, and avoid, minimize, and/or compensate for any adverse impacts on local communities.
- Not trade and/or produce grains in areas associated with forced labor, slave-like labor, or child labor, and not be included on the Brazilian Ministry of Labor and Employment's "Dirty List" (Register of Employers) for slave-like labor, whenever such list is officially issued and available for consultation.
- Not trade and/or produce grains originating from deforested areas or areas with any other environmental irregularities.
- Comply with applicable legislation concerning overlaps between properties and Protected Areas (Conservation Units), Quilombola Territories, and Indigenous Lands.
- Not trade and/or produce grains in areas listed under embargoes imposed by the following authorities: the Brazilian Institute of Environment and Renewable Natural Resources (IBAMA), the Chico Mendes Institute for Biodiversity Conservation (ICMBio), and State Environmental Secretariats (including SEMA-MT).
- Report any concerns or questions regarding this Policy to the Sustainability Directorate.
- Report any act that may constitute a violation or potential violation of this Policy, or that may be inconsistent with applicable national or international laws and regulations, through MBRF's Whistleblowing Channel, available by telephone, website, or email.

Such monitoring may include supply chain traceability and territorial monitoring procedures. MBRF may request clarifications and supporting information, establish mitigation measures, and, where appropriate, suspend and/or terminate contracts with Business Partners that fail to comply with the guidelines established in this Policy and other normative documents governing Business Partner management.

Progress related to monitoring activities will be disclosed through the Company's Integrated Report and/or other corporate reporting mechanisms, as part of MBRF's continuous efforts to strengthen its Sustainability Policy and Business Partner Code of Conduct.

This document is valid as from the date of its issue and shall be modified at any time and discretion.

This Policy applies exclusively to the commodities mentioned herein and to operations involving the purchase of grains sourced from Brazilian biomes.

Individuals violating this Policy will be subject to the legal/disciplinary applicable measures, to be determined by the MBRF competent administrators.

It will be incumbent upon the editor area to clarify any possible doubts, establish the procedures required for implementation, checking and dissemination of the rules mentioned in this document.

GLOSSARY

Conservation Units (Protected Areas): Legally protected areas established for the purpose of conserving nature and environmental resources.

IBAMA (Brazilian Institute of Environment and Renewable Natural Resources): Federal authority responsible for environmental enforcement and the application of embargoes in areas where environmental violations have been identified.

ICMBio (Chico Mendes Institute for Biodiversity Conservation): Federal agency responsible for managing federal Conservation Units and conducting environmental enforcement activities within those areas, including the issuance of embargoes and other sanctions.

Indigenous Lands: Lands traditionally occupied by Indigenous People and formally recognized by the Brazilian Federal Government as their permanent territories, intended to ensure their physical and cultural continuity in accordance with their customs, traditions, and ways of life.

Quilombola Territories: Areas occupied by the descendants of Quilombola communities and officially recognized by the State as ethnic-racial territories intended to safeguard the cultural, social, and economic continuity of these communities.

SEMA (State Environmental Secretariat): State-level environmental authority responsible for environmental licensing, monitoring, and enforcement, with the authority to issue embargoes and restrictions related to environmental violations.
